- The Climate crisis is a Human Rights crisis
- The Climate crisis and the Nature crisis are two sides of the same issue
- The Climate crisis is intensifying, in the Arctic faster than elsewhere.
- Climate adaptation and mitigation must respect Human Rights, if not: false solutions, maladaptation

Sámi traditional livelihoods and cultural practices are under threat from climate change and mounting land use pressure justified as green energy transition.

This combined pressure against the basis of the Sami culture; our access to land and resources, heightens the risks of Human Rights violations

- Call for stronger recognition and inclusion of the rights of the Sámi in climate and energy politics
