### **History**

#### 1992

The UN Framework Convention on Climate Change

a framework for international cooperation to combat climate change by limiting average global temperature increases and the resulting climate change, and coping with impacts that were, by then, inevitable.

#### <u>1997</u>

The Kyoto Protocol

Legally binds developed country Parties to emission reduction targets

First commitment period: 2008 - 2012. Second commitment period: 2013 - 2020.

#### 2015

#### The Paris Agreement

Top down goals and "bottom up" actions (nationally determined contributions)

Does not have mandatory quantified GHG reduction commitments like the Kyoto Protocol.

Countries are obligated to report on their contributions and implementation in order for the world to monitor progress towards the Paris goals



#### **Overview**

#### **SUPREME BODIES: COP, CMP & CMA**

- Parties to the UNFCCC (COP) (KP=CMP; PA=CMA)
- Are supreme decision-making bodies
- Meet once a year (Nov./Dec.)

#### SUBSIDIARY BODIES: the SBSTA and the SBI

- Permanent, subordinate to COP/CMP/CMA
- Established by the Convention, serve also the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement
- Meet twice a year (May/June and Nov./Dec.)

CoP serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP)

CoP serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Paris
Agreement (CMA)

**S**ubsidiary **B**ody for **S**cientific and **T**echnological **A**dvice (SBSTA)

**S**ubsidiary **B**ody for **I**mplementation (SBI)

Full membership = all Parties to the UNFCCC participate and decide in the COP<sub>/CMP/CMA</sub> and SB meetings

≠ "Constituted bodies" = expert bodies with **limited** membership (often nominated by groups or constituencies)




#### LOCAL COMMUNITIES AND INDIGENOUS PEOPLES PLATFORM



### Facilitative Working Group (FWG) of the LCIPP

Unique Feature: Co-Chairs and Vice Co-Chairs from Party and IPO Representative

The FWG facilitates the implementation of the LCIPP's three functions.

- Party representatives are appointed by their respective regional groups and constituencies, and Indigenous Peoples representatives are appointed by the Indigenous Peoples, through their focal points
- Members serve for a term of three years and not eligible to serve two consecutive terms




### **FWG Vision and Strategy Statement**






