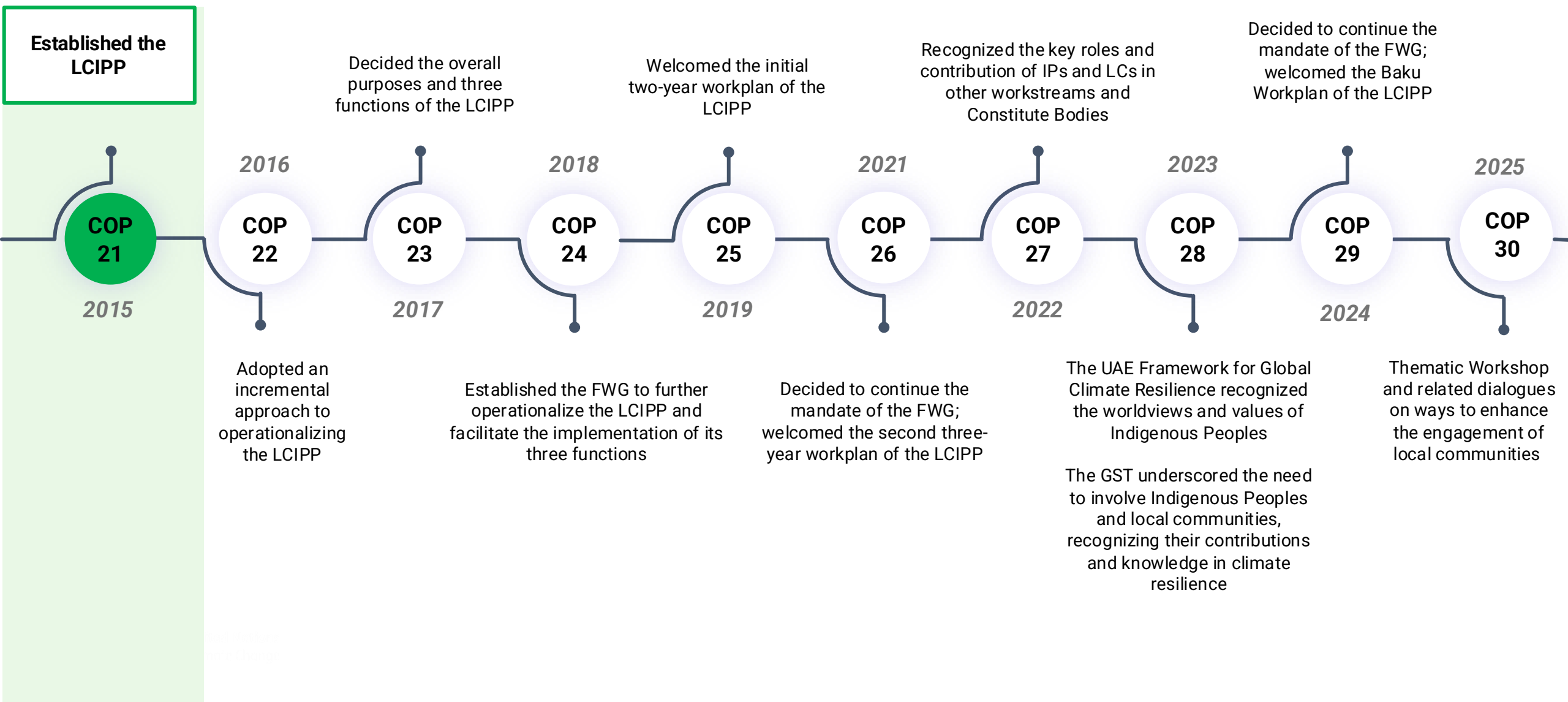

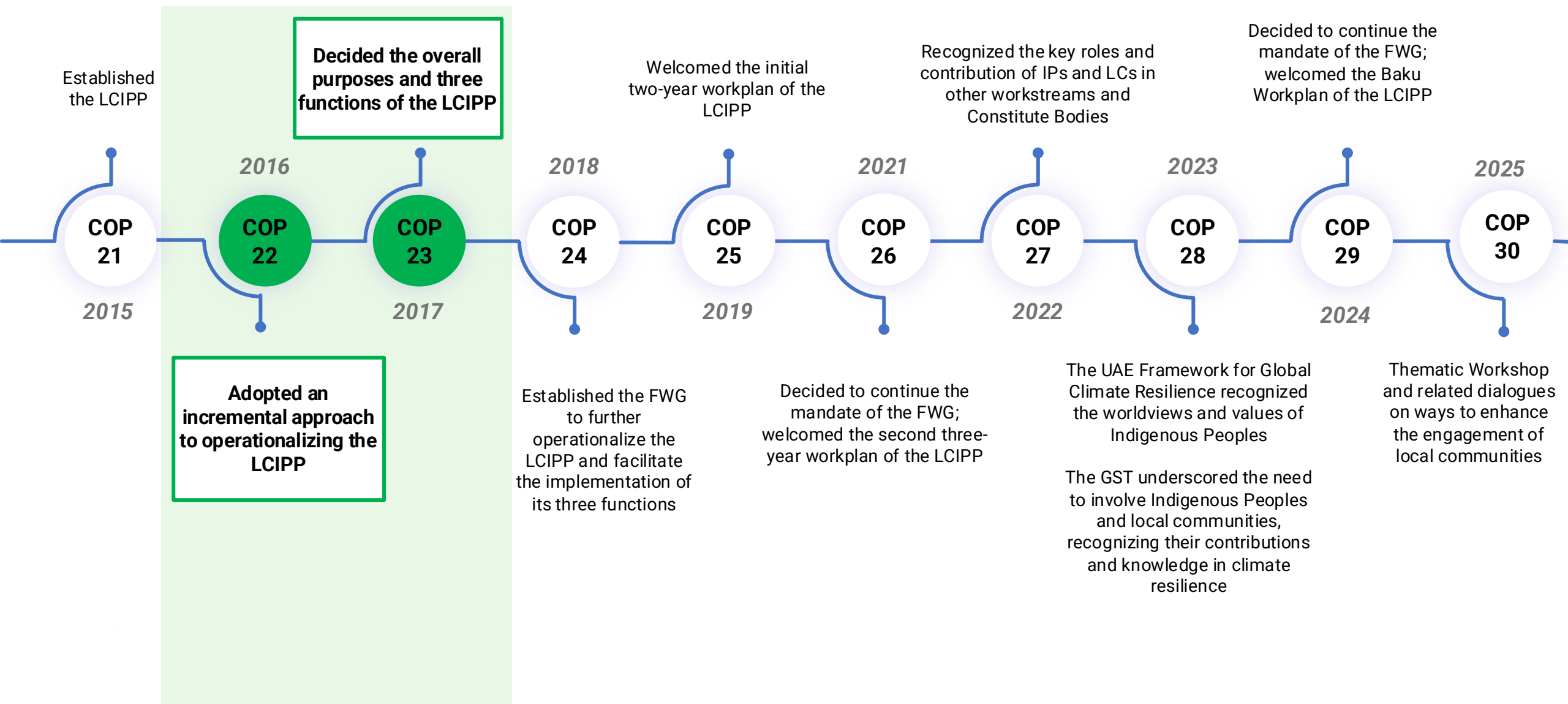

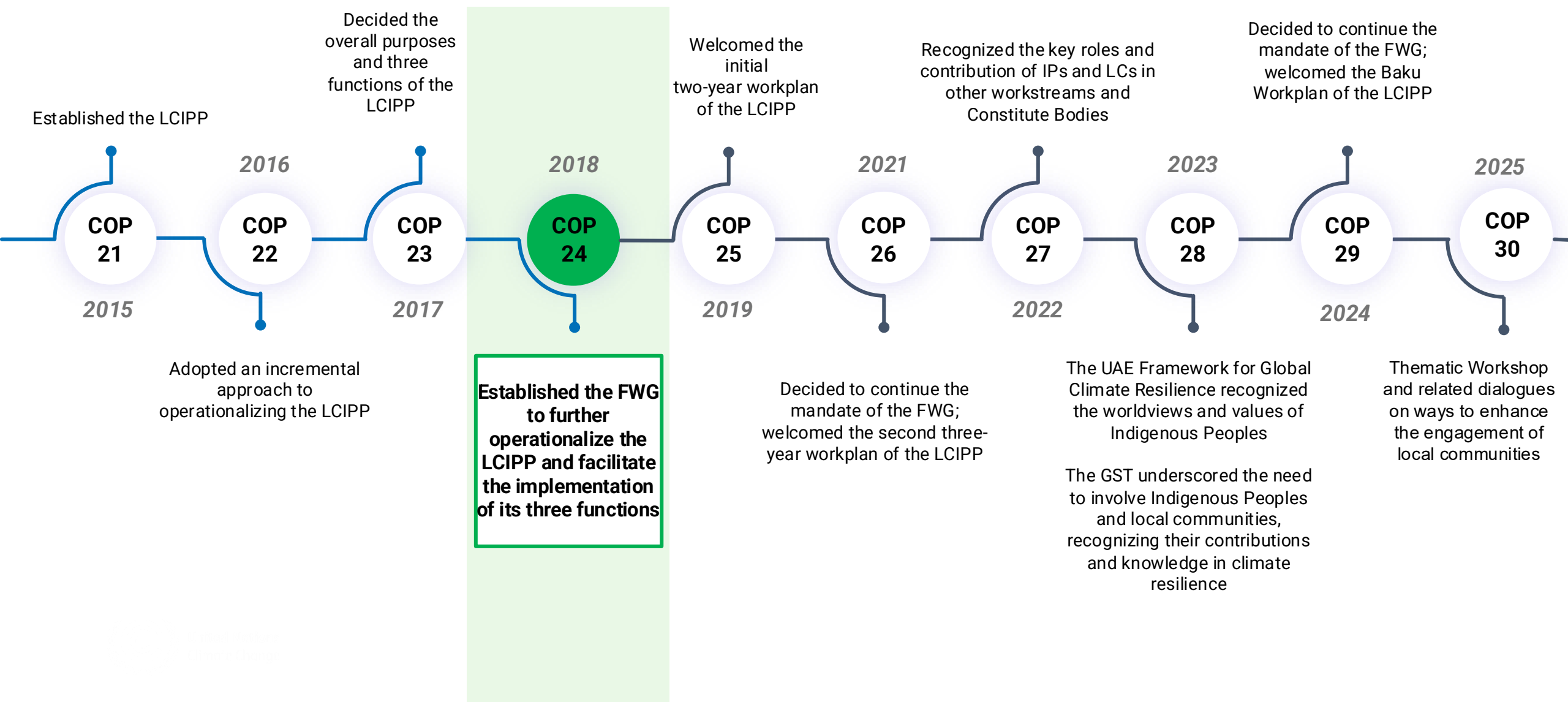

LCIPP+10: A Decade of Shared Commitment to Transformative Climate Action

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Facilitative Working Group (FWG) of the LCIPP

Unique Feature: Co-Chairs and Vice Co-Chairs from Party and IPO Representative

The FWG facilitates the implementation of the LCIPP's three functions.

- Party representatives are appointed by their respective regional groups and constituencies, and Indigenous Peoples representatives are appointed by the Indigenous Peoples, through their focal points
- Members serve for a term of three years and not eligible to serve two consecutive terms

Overview

SUPREME BODIES: COP, CMP & CMA

- Parties to the UNFCCC (COP) (KP=CMP; PA=CMA)
- Are supreme **decision-making** bodies
- Meet **once** a year (Nov./Dec.)

SUBSIDIARY BODIES: the SBSTA and the SBI

- Permanent, **subordinate** to COP/CMP/CMA
- Established by the Convention, serve also the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement
- Meet **twice** a year (May/June and Nov./Dec.)

CoP serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP)

CoP serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA)

Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA)

Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI)

Full membership = **all Parties** to the UNFCCC participate and decide in the COP_{/CMP/CMA} and SB meetings

≠ “Constituted bodies” = expert bodies with **limited** membership (often nominated by groups or constituencies)

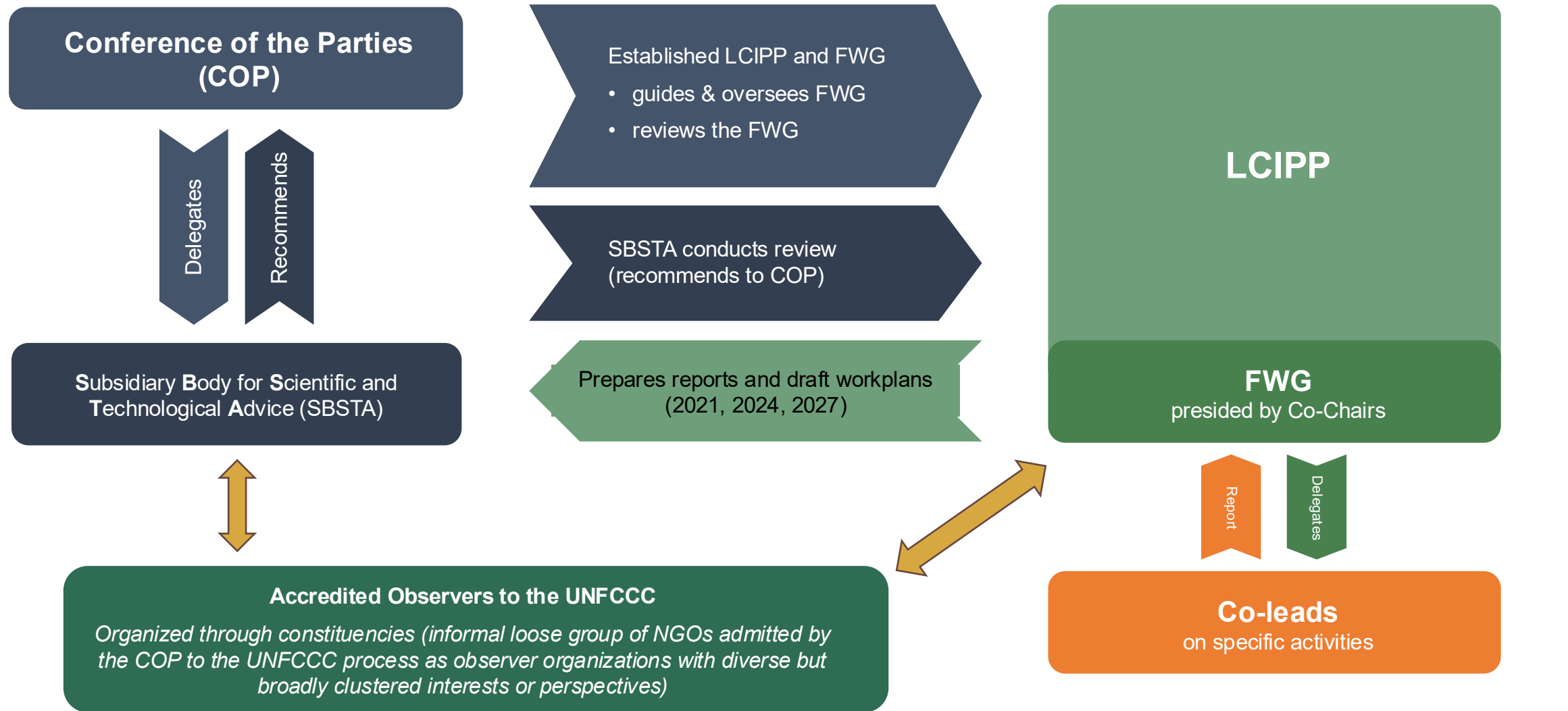

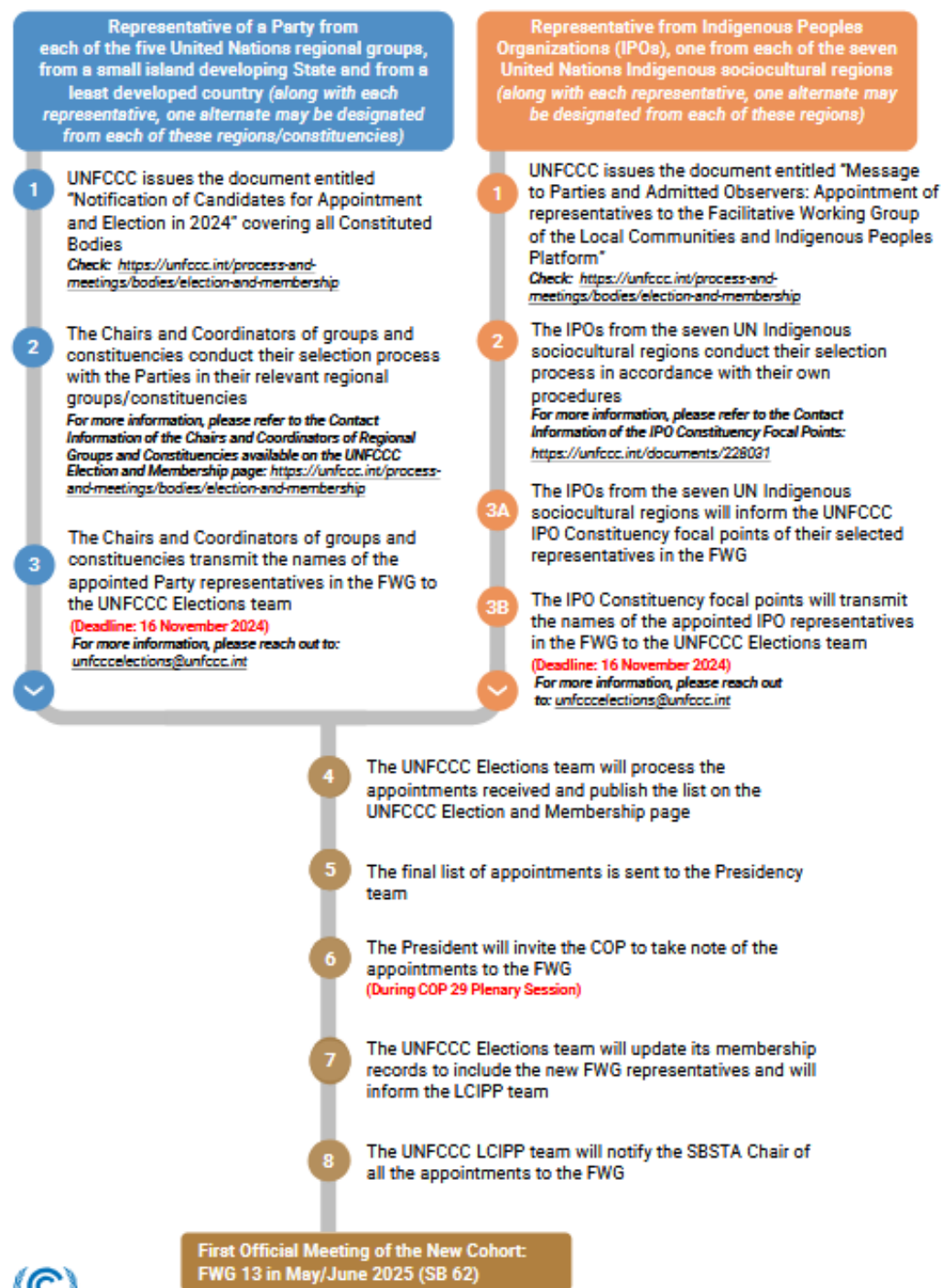
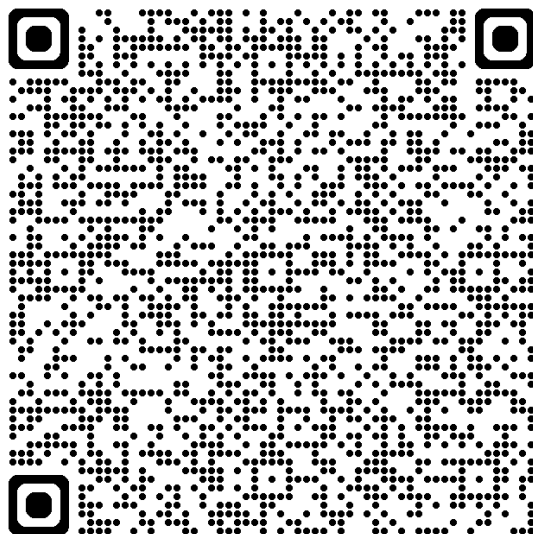

FWG Vision & Strategy Statement (*Adopted at FWG 9*)



FWG, in implementing the three functions of the Platform, strives to elevate the **leadership role** of Indigenous Peoples and local communities in the **collective effort** toward **transformative climate policies and actions** by:

- ✓ upholding a **rights-based approach**
- ✓ ethically and equitably engaging **Indigenous values and worldviews**, (such as stewardship of and living in harmony with Mother Earth to ensure its enduring integrity for all life forms today and in the future), and **perspectives from local communities**
- ✓ fostering **full and effective participation** of Indigenous Peoples and local communities in achieving the objectives of the Convention, Kyoto Protocol, and the Paris Agreement.

Care Principles as adopted by FWG 14

- 
- **Speak with Care:** Share from lived experience and welcome all voices with openness, humility, and respect.
 - **Listen with Care:** Engage in active, respectful listening to understand, connect, and build mutual trust.
 - **Practice Awareness and Humility :** Be mindful of our presence and influence in discussions, creating space for others to contribute and be acknowledged.
 - **Ensure Inclusive and Accessible Participation :** Foster an environment where everyone can participate meaningfully by providing interpretation, cultural understanding, and other accessibility measures, as appropriate.
 - **Value and Bridge Diverse Knowledge Systems :** Recognize that addressing climate change requires collective wisdom and all forms of knowledge.

What is it?

Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform (LCIPP)

A platform created by the Conference of the Parties (COP)

Facilitative Working Group (FWG) of the LCIPP

A constituted body in the UNFCCC process

Indigenous Peoples Organizations (IPO) Constituency

An informal loose group of NGOs admitted by the COP to the UNFCCC process as observer organizations with diverse but broadly clustered interests or perspectives. It has an internal oversight and coordination mechanism



Who created it and when?

In 2015, the COP, through Decision 1/CP.21

135. Recognizes the need to strengthen knowledge, technologies, practices and efforts of local communities and indigenous peoples related to addressing and responding to climate change, and establishes a platform for the exchange of experiences and sharing of best practices on mitigation and adaptation in a holistic and integrated manner

In 2018, at COP 24 in Katowice, Decision 2/CP.24 created the Facilitative Working Group (FWG)

The secretariat formally recognized the IPO Constituency of admitted Indigenous Peoples NGOs in time for COP 7 in 2001.



What are its functions?

In 2017, at COP 23, Decision 2/CP.23 outlined the three functions of the LCIPP

a. Knowledge: the platform should promote the exchange of experience and best practices with a view to applying, strengthening, protecting and preserving traditional knowledge, knowledge of indigenous peoples and local knowledge systems, as well as technologies, practices and efforts of local

FWG was established to “further operationalize the LCIPP and facilitate the implementation of its functions.”

For the secretariat, the functions are effective communication between the large number of admitted NGOs and the secretariat on engagement opportunities in various aspects in the UNFCCC process. The interaction between the secretariat and the IPO is through the focal points who:

- Provide a conduit for the exchange of official information between their Constituency and the secretariat;

communities and indigenous peoples related to addressing and responding to climate change, taking into account the free, prior and informed consent of the holders of such knowledge, innovations and practices;

- b. **Capacity for engagement:** the platform should build the capacity of indigenous peoples and local communities to enable their engagement in the UNFCCC process and the capacity of Parties and other relevant stakeholders to engage with the platform and with local communities and indigenous peoples, including in the context of the implementation of the Paris Agreement and other climate change related processes;
- c. **Climate change policies and actions:** the platform should facilitate the integration of diverse knowledge systems, practices and innovations in designing and implementing international and national actions, programmes and policies in a manner that respects and promotes the rights and interests of local communities and indigenous peoples. The platform should also

- Assist the secretariat in ensuring an effective participation appropriate to an intergovernmental meeting;
- Coordinate NGO interactions at sessions including convening constituency meetings, organizing meetings with officials, providing names for the speakers list and representation at official functions;
- Provide logistical support to their constituents during sessions;
- Assist the secretariat in realizing representative observer participation at workshops and other limited-access meetings

For the IPO members, the functions are effective engagement in the UNFCCC process and capacity building of the members who are relatively new to the process. This includes:

- Information sharing on engagement opportunities in the UNFCCC process both intersessionally and in-sessionally.
- Development of constituency-wide positions and statements at Plenary meetings, the high-level segment and/or contact groups of various agenda items.

Indigenous Peoples Organizations (IPO) Constituency

- Nomination of representatives to various engagement opportunities in a way that is fair and well-coordinated across the seven socio-cultural regions
- Channeling the feedback from the Constituency members to the COP Presidency, the secretariat, and other presiding officers.



How does it operate?

The LCIPP mandate is realized by implementing the activities under its workplan.

The Facilitative Working Group (FWG) of LCIPP, implements the LCIPP workplan

The FWG is currently implementing the Baku Workplan of the LCIPP

The FWG

- Operates on the basis of consensus, per decision 2/CP.24, para 15.
- Meets twice per year in conjunction with the sessions of the SBs and the session of the COP
- Comprises 14 members:
 - One representative of a Party from each of the UN regional groups
 - One representative of a Party from a SIDS
 - One representative of a least-developed country Party
 - Seven representatives from IPOs, one from each of the seven UN Indigenous sociocultural regions

Through the co-chairs who are nominated periodically with internal governance and oversight established over decades.

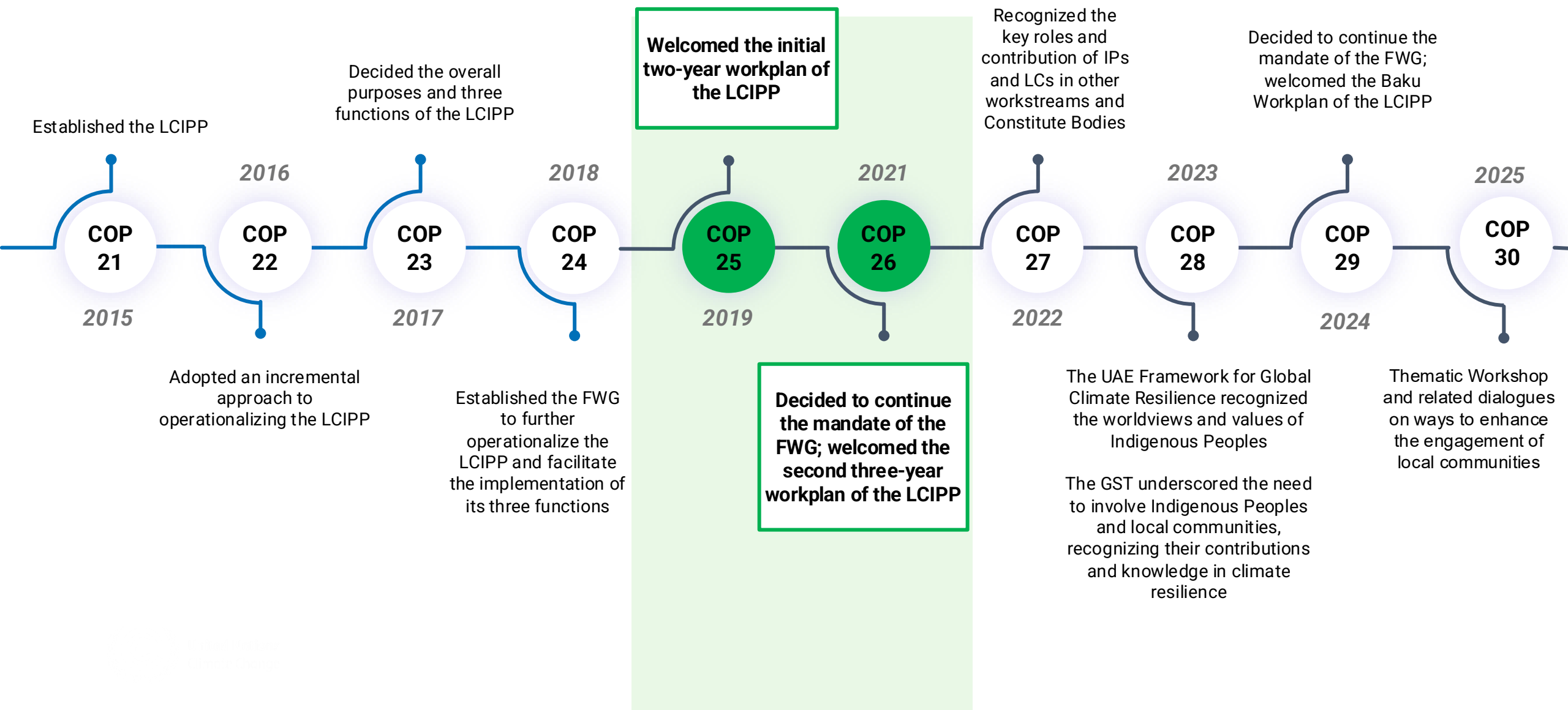

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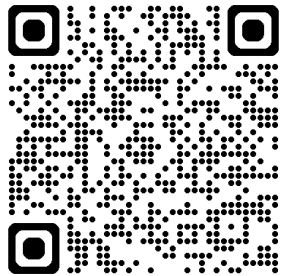

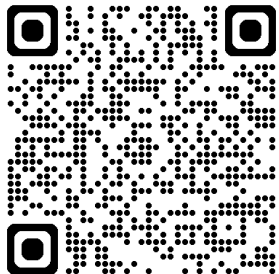
Deliverables:

- One meeting per year;
- Summary reports on the meetings, which could include recommendations to the FWG on good practices, obstacles and proposed solutions.

Under the function of "knowledge": Organize annual meetings in conjunction with the sessions of the COP, with the participation of indigenous peoples and indigenous knowledge holders, to expand and enhance inclusion of traditional knowledge of indigenous peoples and local knowledge systems in addressing and responding to climate change, consistently with rights-based international safeguards and the cultural protocols of indigenous peoples.

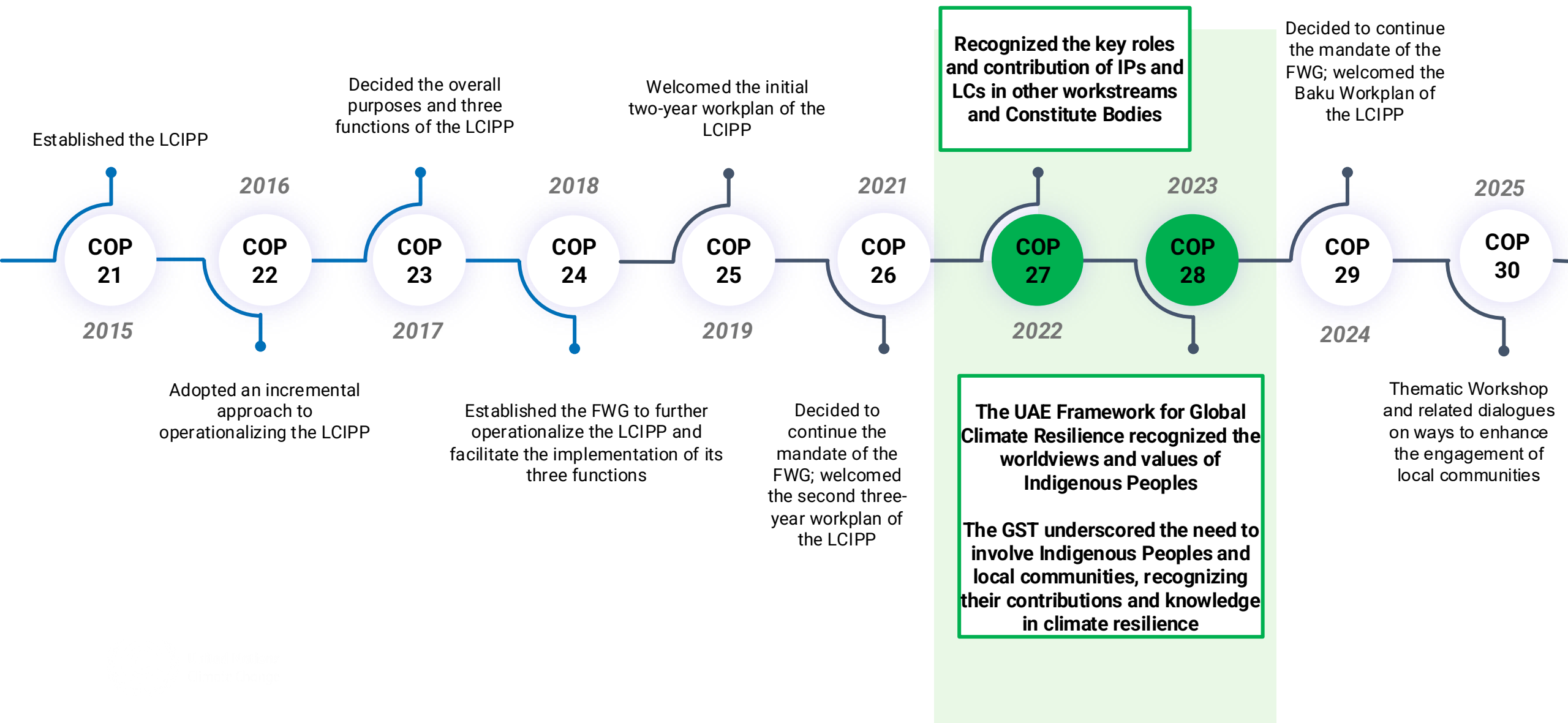
The aim of the annual meetings will be to build the engagement of indigenous youth, women, children, persons with disabilities and youth from local communities in all levels and aspects of climate action and bring together strategies and technologies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and build climate resilience.

Deliverables:

- One gathering per year in conjunction with the session of the COP, to take place in round-table discussion format, divided into two parts: one for indigenous peoples including indigenous youth and persons of different genders, and a focus on intergenerational knowledge-sharing.

- 5.1 **Conduct targeted outreach to and engage with national focal points**, including but not limited to national focal points to the UNFCCC, loss and damage contact points, adaptation contact points, national gender and climate change focal points and national Action for Climate Empowerment focal points.
- 5.2 **Hold an annual dialogue** for Indigenous Peoples, local communities and Parties to promote the ethical and equitable engagement of values and knowledge systems of Indigenous Peoples and local knowledge systems in the design and implementation of NAPs, NDCs and national communications.

- 5.3 **Develop recommendations and guidance on best practices to ensure the ethical and equitable engagement, protection, and use of traditional knowledge, the knowledge of Indigenous Peoples, and local knowledge systems**, including through an ethics protocol to be created with the direct involvement of Indigenous Peoples and local communities and used at the gatherings of knowledge holders, regional (or biregional) gatherings, and seventh-generation round tables.
- 5.4 Enhance the participation of Indigenous Peoples and local communities in the UNFCCC process, prioritizing direct participation, including of youth and women, in training sessions and workshops of relevant constituted bodies and UNFCCC workstreams, in order to facilitate their contribution to the process of formulating, implementing and communicating climate policies and actions.
- 5.5 **Develop a draft ethics protocol before the 15th meeting of the FWG** and enhance the participation of Indigenous Peoples and local communities in the UNFCCC process throughout the year.

Foster national-level climate action planning and implementation, including the development of policies and programmes that increasingly reflect the values, worldviews, knowledge systems and priorities of Indigenous Peoples and local knowledge.

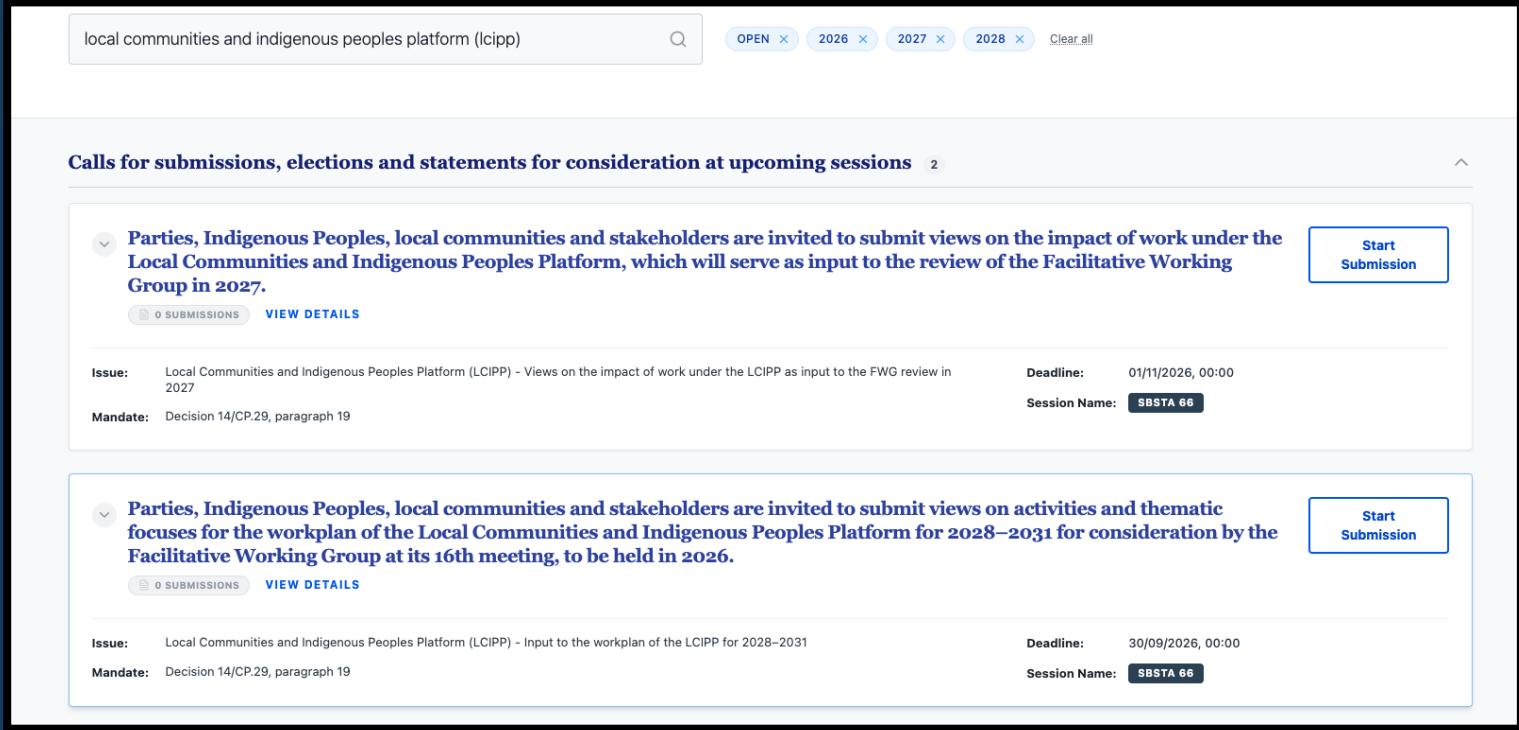
